In 2022, we are pleased to report that we returned to the “new normal” as it relates to delivery of professional police services following two years of the COVID-19 pandemic. Although we continue to take the necessary precautions to keep our staff safe, we recognize that we need to return to our proactive community policing, crime prevention, and enforcement efforts to ensure a safe and prosperous community. We would like to thank our community for remaining vigilant by reporting suspicious activity, suspected scams, and criminal activity.

We continued to retain and replace police officers consistent with a nationwide turnover of police officers. We added Chaplain Laird Baldwin to our staff which will coincide with our officer wellness initiative and crime prevention efforts. Additionally, we added Mrs. Brittany Ferguson to our staff as a part-time public safety administrative assistant, which will provide support for both police and fire departments. We continue to operate under budget and remain fiscally responsible. We continue to receive grant funding for our body armor program and receive generous donations for our much-needed equipment and community policing initiatives.

This year, we received a generous donation from the Brookville VFW Post # 3288, which made it possible to purchase our Body Worn Cameras. This donation was instrumental in allowing us to continue our proactive criminal justice reform efforts which have been ongoing since 2000. We continue to remain recognized by Lexipol Connect for retaining our Gold Standard for excellence in law enforcement policy management. Lastly, we remain certified by the Ohio Collaborative which sets the professional standards and best practices for the State of Ohio “to ensure accountability and instill greater public confidence.”

In closing, it remains a pleasure and honor to serve as your police chief. I will continue to meet and exceed the expectations of our community. I remain determined to seek and provide the men and women of the City of Brookville Police Department the tools and technology needed to perform their duties in a rapidly changing society.

City of Brookville Police Chief  
1986-2003  
Passed Away December 16, 2022**



Andrew J. "Andy" Papanek, age 83, passed away peacefully on December 16, 2022, in Miamisburg, Ohio. Andy was born to the late Andrew and Anna Papanek on October 5, 1939. He graduated from Butler High School, was a veteran of the United States Air Force, and attended Sinclair Community College. In 1964 he was hired as a deputy sheriff with the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office and began a distinguished career in law enforcement that spanned 37 years. Andrew attended the FBI National Academy and ultimately achieved the rank of Chief Deputy. He went on to serve as Chief of Police in Brookville, Ohio from 1986 until retiring in 2003. After retiring from law enforcement, he was employed as the Vice President of Anderson Security and served as a Miami Township Trustee.

# 2022 POLICE DEPARTMENT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- The Police Department remained fiscally responsible and operated under budget for the eleventh year in a row.
- 2022 FBI Uniform Crime Reporting: Part I Crimes - Decreased by 10% (see page 13), and Part II Crimes - Decreased by 28% (see page 14). Drug overdoses decreased by 82%.
- We received \$685.61 in grant funding from the Ohio Law Enforcement Body Armor Program.
- We maintain certification from the Ohio Collaborative Law Enforcement Agency in Groups 1-4 as well as the Re-Certification Group.
- Annual training hours increased by 66%.
- Charity Events Through Donations – Shepherd's Hands and FISH Food Bank (Officers No Shave Beard Money), Adopted (8) Families for Christmas, and IGA Secret Shopper Program.
- Completed Community Engagement Events: Veterans Day Lunch at Rob's, Good Night Lights at Dayton Children's Hospital, Trick-or-Treat Safety Presentations, Pink Ribbon Girls 5K Walk, Pink Ribbon Girls Cruiser Project, No Shave Charity Event for F.I.S.H & Shepherd's Hands Food Pantries, Ghostly Night Out Event, Coffee With A Cop, Amvets Ride To The Wall Event, Baseball Parade, Soccer Parade, and Homecoming Parade, Community Picnic Crime Prevention Booth, and more. Brookville Local Schools: Walk to School, Master Reader Program, and Veterans Day Program.

# ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- We maintained a Proactive History of Criminal Justice Reform document which provides a transparent overview of our reform efforts dating back to 2000. In 2022, we added significant “proactive actions.” We added Verizon Reveal Connect to all cruisers, Crisis Intervention Training, Body Worn Cameras, Use of Force Review Board, Designated Ohio BCI as to investigate Officer Involved Shootings, and a Vehicle Pursuit Review Board.
- We continue to maintain Lexipol policies associated with criminal justice reform. In 2022, we received the 2021 Lexipol Gold Standard Award.
- We maintained Certification in Ohio Collaborative Standards - Groups 1-4 and the Re-Certification Group associated with criminal justice reform.





## EDUCATION AND TRAINING ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Captain Morgan completed his Associate of Applied Science in Criminal Justice Degree at Eastern Gateway Community College.
- Firearms Training Sessions: State Qualifications, Hogan's Alley, Shoot House, and more.
- All officers were re-certified in Less Lethal Use of Force Options which includes Pepper Ball Guns and Shot Gun Bean Bag Rounds.
- Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy - Continuing Professional Training (24 hours per officer). The topics included: Cultural Humanity, Diversity, Inclusion, and Equity, Responding to Mental Health Crisis, Use of Force, Legal Updates, Officer Personnel Wellness, Responding to Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, and Response to Mass Protest and Demonstrations.
- Officers received the following training components: Crisis Intervention Training, Use of Force, Taser Refresher, Ethics and Professionalism, Duty to Intercede, CPR & AED, First Line Supervision, Field Training Officer, and 4,031DTB's (Daily Training Bulletins). Overall, we completed 1223 training hours.


