Ordinance No. **2007-21** Passed NOVEMBER 6, 20 07

AN ORDINANCE CONFIRMING AND RATIFYING THE JANUARY 7, 1919 VACATION OF A PART OF SUMMIT STREET (NOW KNOWN AS MCKINLEY STREET) AND A PART OF ORCHARD STREET, AND DECLARING IT AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, on January 7, 1919, the Council of the Village of Brookville passed an ordinance that provided for vacation of Summit Street (now known as McKinley Street) from the rear of Lot No. 129 to the intersection of Summit and Orchard Streets, and that part of Orchard Street between a line connecting the south part of Lot No. 135 to a line connecting the north part of Lot No. 147 to the north part of Lot No. 128. A copy of a summary of the minutes from the January 7, 1919 meeting is attached hereto as Exhibit "A"; and

WHEREAS, a copy of this Ordinance passed on January 7, 1919 has not been found in the records of the City of Brookville and Montgomery County, Ohio; and

WHEREAS, Montgomery County Engineering has requested that this Ordinance No. 2007-21 be passed to provide an official record of said street vacation and an ordinance number for said street vacation; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 2007-21 is now passed to confirm and ratify the action taken by the Council of the Village of Brookville on January 7, 1919.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BROOKVILLE, OHIO THAT:

SECTION I:

The Council hereby ratifies and confirms the January 7, 1919 vacation of a part of Summit Street (now known as McKinley Street) from the rear of Lot No. 129 to the intersection of Summit and Orchard Streets and that part of Orchard Street between a line connecting the south part of Lot No. 135 to a line connecting the north part of Lot No. 147 to the north part of Lot No. 128, said vacated area being more particularly described in Exhibit "B" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

SECTION II:


A certified copy of this Ordinance and plat of this street vacation shall be filed with the office of the Montgomery County Recorder, and a copy of this Ordinance shall be submitted to the office of the Montgomery County Auditor.


SECTION III:

This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure to preserve the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the City of Brookville to authorize the immediate vacation of this street and thereby permit the Brookville Local Schools to proceed with re-platting of their Hill Street property. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage of this Ordinance as provided by the Charter of the City of Brookville.

We have manual training, domestic science and art. We need a new building since the new district was formed. A new building can be erected for about \$50,000. We need a new building or at least a temporary building of 4 rooms. What should we do?

Letter from Supt.: Some people think that the material of the old school building should be used in the construction of one large building to accommodate all the children. The law forbids the tearing down of building unless provision is made for the school to continue while the new building is being erected. This could not be done. 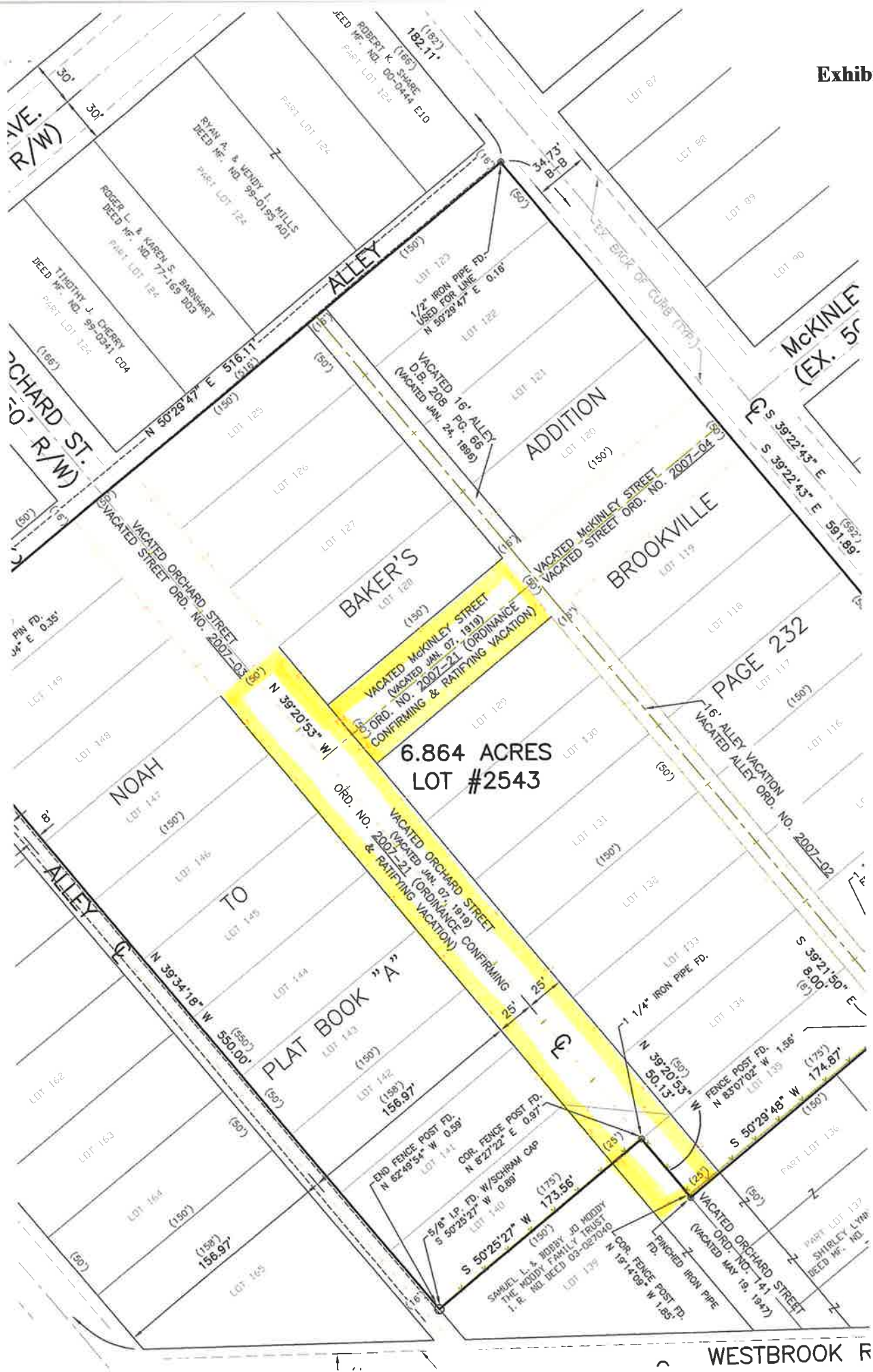
