2019 Officer of The Year

Officer Jason Jacobs was named the 2019 Officer of The Year. He was instrumental in our drug enforcement efforts. He led the department in arrests and citations. He took an active role in our misdemeanor and felony criminal investigations as our department worked without a detective for most of 2019. Lastly, Officer Jacobs assisted in training our new police personnel as well as the planning and coordination of two regional training programs held in the Brookville Fire Department Training Center.

2019 Departmental Accomplishments

- ▶ The Police Department has remained fiscally responsible and operated underbudget for the eighth year in a row (2012-2019).
- ▶ We received several Federal and State grants this year through the Federal Bulletproof Vest Partnership (\$1,252.42) and the Ohio Law Enforcement Body Armor Program (\$2,677.72).
- ▶ We added (6) Smith & Wesson AR-15 M & P - 15 Sport II rifles to our inventory giving us (12) total.
- ▶ We received Final Certification from the Ohio Collaborative Law Enforcement Agency in ALL categories which include: Use of Force, Recruitment and Hiring, Group 1RC1-Use of Force, Group 1RC1-Recruitment and Hiring, Community Engagement, Bias Free Policing, Investigation of Employee Misconduct, Use of Force, and Hiring.
- ▶ Community Policing and Outreach Programs - Coffee with A Cop, Baseball Parade, Soccer Parade, Homecoming Parade, Fire Prevention Parade, Pink Ribbon Girls Breast Cancer Walk, Pink Ribbon Cruiser Project, Ghostly Night Out, Feed Brookville Thanksgiving Lunch, Veterans Day Lunch at Rob's, Community Preschool Trike-A-Thon, Optimist Pumpkin Walk, Brookville Elementary & Community Pre-School Trick or Treat Safety Programs, Breakfast with Santa, Officer Down 5K (fifth annual), Community Picnic 5K, Community Picnic Event, Toys for Tots, Chamber of Commerce Tree Lighting and Christmas in the Park.
- ▶ We participated in the Combined Agency OVI Task Force and the Montgomery County IMPACT Group (Improving Modern Police and Community Trust) for the first six months of 2019.
- ▶ We continue to increase our drug enforcement efforts.
- ▶ The Police Department used 38% less sick time in 2019 than 2018. This number includes all working members of the department throughout the entire year. We had one officer which applied for and received a medical retirement in 2019. His sick leave hours were not included in the overall computation.

2019 Education and Training



- In 2019, our officers completed 622 hours of training. This year our training hours were approximately 184 hours less than 2018, but due to the Memorial Day Tornado and staffing issues, it was unavoidable.
- In 2019, Officer Morgan and Officer Beaver completed their Evidence Technician Certifications which includes 80 hours of instruction at the Montgomery County Crime Laboratory. The cost of each course is \$1,250.00 but we attended for FREE because we are active members(\$2,500.00 savings). Officer Jacobs completed a First Line Supervision course which includes 32 hours of instruction.
- Major Simon was recertified as a Glock Armorer and Taser Instructor. SRO Snell attended and was certified as an ALICE Instructor (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate). SRO Snell will now be able to instruct our agency and school personnel alike in active shooter situations. The Brookville Local Schools paid for his tuition in the ALICE course as well as the SRO Annual Conference.
- The entire police department was recertified in CPR/AED. The entire department also attended multiple firearms sessions and passed required State of Ohio requalification's in handgun, shotgun, and rifle.
- The entire police department is required to complete DTB's (Daily Training Bulletins) which is basically a scenario-based policy review with test questions to demonstrate understanding of content. In 2019, our department completed 4,367 DTB's.
- In 2019, we completed the following community outreach training programs: active shooter, bullying, dangers of social media & youth, human trafficking, leadership & management, opioid awareness, and W.A.S.P (female self defense).
- Major Simon completed all course of studies for his Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice Administration at Columbia Southern University and his degree should be conferred in January 2020.
- Chief Jerome completed all course of studies for his PhD in Public Policy & Administration and Public Management & Leadership at Walden University. Chief Jerome is now considered ABD (All But Dissertation) and he will be starting the dissertation process in February 2020.
- Officer Jacobs enrolled at Columbia Southern University to start his Associate of Applied Science in Criminal Justice. His courses begin in January 2020. Officer Morgan enrolled in Eastern Gateway Community College to start his Associate of Applied Science in Criminal Science. His courses begin in January 2020.







Officer Henry Edds Combined OPERS Full-Service Retirement






Traffic Crash Comparison






Drug Overdose Comparison


ANNUAL FOOT PATROL STATISTICS



Memorial Day Tornado May 27, 2019

Departmental and Community Highlights

- The City of Brookville effectively used the Hyper Reach Messaging System 16 times between May 28, 2019 and June 3, 2019 to keep our residents informed of all pertinent information relating to emergency information, public services, available resources, water conditions, curfew in affected areas, and more.
- The City of Brookville Police Department enacted the first known community curfew in the department's history as a result of a natural disaster based on the severity of the EF4 tornado and in the affected areas. The ultimate goal was to prevent looting from unoccupied structures following evacuations that had taken place. This curfew was supported in a court order issued by Judge James D. Piergies of the Montgomery County Municipal Court, Western Division.
- We coordinated and used a limited number of volunteers as "citizens on patrol" throughout the week following the tornado, primarily in the Terrace Park Subdivision. These patrols were primarily between 2200-0600 hrs.
- We requested and received mutual aid assistance from the following police organizations: Ohio State Patrol, Jackson Twp. Police, City of Union Police, New Lebanon Police, Clay Twp. Police and Englewood Police.
- Chief Jerome and Fire Chief Fletcher proudly served on the Brookville Fire Association's Tornado Relief Committee which was tasked with distributing donated funds through the Tornado Relief Assistance Program. This program proudly distributed more than \$60,000 in donated funds.
- The overtime costs related to post tornado relief efforts i.e. safety and security are \$13,845.67 (labor & fringe benefits). The equipment costs i.e. cruisers is \$2,988.95.
- The worst damaged areas included Meadows of Brookville, Terrace Park Subdivision, Wenger Woods, and Brookville Local Schools. Although safety and security concerns were paramount, so were relief efforts, staffing, and crime prevention protocols in affected and unaffected areas. One of our top priorities in the affected areas was to protect our community from potential scams and price gouging.
- We assisted in the successful coordination and operation of a tornado relief distribution center, volunteer and relief services center, and on-site clean-up operation in affected areas.
